

At Woodlarks, people with disabilities enjoy the unique experience of camping in a beautiful place, enabled to join in stimulating activities such as games, craft, BBQs, cookouts, swimming, aerial runway, party nights and even chores!

Who Comes

Normally more than 400 persons with disabilities camp at Woodlarks over the summer months, their stay varying from a day to a week. Usually, a total of 1000 people camp here during the year. Schools and organisations book some weeks, while many weeks are open to anyone according to age, gender, and interest. These weeks are run by teams of volunteers, who provide whatever level of care and help anyone may require. The Trust supplies everything needed for accessible camping including indoor accommodation and welfare facilities.

More volunteers are always needed and welcomed. Woodlarks offers fun and friendship.

Honorary Treasurer's Report

2022 saw Woodlarks Camp Site open for the first time since the Covid-19 pandemic and hundreds of campers and helpers returned to enjoy holidays in beautiful surroundings in the Surrey countryside. Numbers were slightly down in comparison with the 2019 pre-pandemic season, as there was understandably a desire to prevent overcrowding in buildings and for fewer persons sleeping in bunkhouse tents.

Camp Fees

2022 also saw the first increase in camp fees for many years, which are now based on the budget for essential running costs of the site and are gradually increasing in increments until 2025 when they will pay for 50% of essential running costs. This small rise in fees meant that income from camp fees remained at approximately £36,000, despite the slight reduction in numbers attending.

These essential costs for 2022-2023 will be £135,000 and do NOT include funds for projects or development work undertaken by the Trust (for example, the new pantry). Non-essential costs, such as projects, are funded through donations, successful grant applications (hopefully) and the occasional legacy. Trustees will strive to subsidise essential costs affecting camp fees by 50% from 2025 onwards.

So, during the 2023 and 2024 camping seasons, the Trust will subsidise camp fees by 59% and 54% respectively, reaching a 50% subsidy in 2025. Therefore, the following fees will apply for 2023 season:

2023 Camping Fees for 7 nights (whole week) per person per week	£95.00
2023 Day Visitor Fees (not staying overnight) per person per day	£8.00
2023 Day Visitor Fees (staying overnight) per person per night	£14

Woodlarks Never Sleeps

Ever wondered what happens outside the camping season? Many of you know Woodlarks is a unique place and is very special to those who attend, whatever time of year.

The camping season runs from May through to the end of September. We also run an annual Grotto in December for some of the schools who visit in the summer as well as local schools for children with disabilities. Several volunteers helping to set up and derig through November into January. The rest of the off-season time we are very privileged and lucky to have dedicated volunteers come on site for 'working parties' and engineering week. (When everything is serviced, PAT tested etc) Woodlarks is proud to say that there is only 1 person employed and we rely on the invaluable volunteers that attend both in and out of the camping season.

During working parties several groups attend, mainly over the weekends, working to a job list - no job too small or big depending on the skills of volunteers attending - all vital to the upkeep of camp. Here are just a few examples.

- Continuous clearing of leaves and grounds maintenance around site
- Painting and carpentry
- Maintenance of buildings, electrics, equipment, and plumbing,
- Tree, pool, and tent maintenance
- Washing of all blankets, cleaning pots and pans, and deep cleaning, ensuring site is ready for opening
- Ongoing applications for funding of grants, fund raising, updating policies

When the camping season starts the site is hired out to different groups each week, many 'open' camps, schools and hospices. They are independently run and selfsufficient. Camp leaders have the responsibility of fundraising, catering, planning activities and getting their own volunteers to help during the week ensuring all that attend can have a fun filled week.

Even during the season maintenance of the site is ongoing - Pool maintenance, ground maintenance, and many other jobs.

After a 3-year break we are happy to say that the Woodlarks Grotto went ahead the week of the 5th December 2022. During that week we welcomed 11 schools, 2 hospices, 2 other organisations as well as staff of Squires Garden Centre Frensham. They have supported Woodlarks for the past 2 years and made us their Charity of the Year. Our volunteers fundraise throughout the year and each child receives a gift of their choice. In total about 200 children saw Santa.

We think it's fair to say it was magical and a great success, with the volunteers being pleased to be back. We set up every weekend in November and our amazing volunteers then went on to stay onsite for the week we ran, dressing up as elves, snow people



and this year Santa's Granny visited too! It takes up a lot of people's time, but it is so worth it. It was at times very moving as the children got caught up in the wonder of Christmas, as did the school staff, and our volunteers! Of course, what goes up must come down and for 2 weekends in the New Year, our volunteers returned to put everything away.

Unfortunately, due to planned building works on site in the closed season, the Grotto may not be able to run this year, but we will ensure, as we did through shutdowns, that the children still receive their gift from Santa.



Our volunteers made it such a success, some coming from as far as the north of England. Without their hard work, commitment, and love of Grotto, it just wouldn't run. The reason we started the Grotto was because it was apparent that many of our children with special needs simply cannot access a grotto on the high street due to practicalities or the nature of their disabilities. At Woodlarks they are in an environment that takes their needs into account, we have facilities that mean they receive care with dignity, and they are entertained by people who understand their challenges and just plain love Christmas. We are very proud of everyone's enthusiasm. Here's to the next Grotto!

Working Parties Shefford working party

Our group of friends have been attending working parties since the early 90's when we came along with the Shefford Venture Scout group. Since then, the Scouting link has faded but the biannual working weekend has remained with friends, partners and children all coming together for a weekend of socialising whilst getting all sorts of jobs done to fix, build or maintain all manner of things around the site.

Nick always produces a fantastic list of jobs which suit a range of skills and ages so that we can all get involved. We often get to grips with a large project that is the focus of the weekend whilst also tacking the other jobs as well.

In October we started the deconstruction of the retaining wall on the path which

leads up behind the pool to the woodland shelter. The timber was rotting badly so with mini-digger and dumper truck in action we got the task underway. I hope that when camps start in a few months' time, the path will be complete, and the easier gradient will make accessing the woods much easier for everyone.

Lots of other jobs were also tackled – cleaning out the drains was one that was more rewarding than it sounds! We also checked how some of the younger trees were doing in the woodland making sure the guards on them were still secure to prevent the deer from eating them for lunch! Inevitably wheelbarrows come into use at some point during the weekend. Taking a ride is always a favourite with our younger crew especially if it means dodging an uphill walk!





Pantry Plans

Over the years Woodlarks has seen some redevelopments, Bradbury Croft, the pool changing rooms, the timber framed tent, and latterly refurbishing the swimming pool last year.


Due to several issues with the pantry, areas of the building are failing, and it has been decided to redevelop this, at the same time enlarging the current footprint and making



level access into the pantry for wheelchair accessibility. Of course, the trench oven is being kept!

Following consultation with several cooks, camp leaders, discussions within a small working group, and the architect we now have a design that is being taken forward.

The current plan is to start the rebuild at the end of the 2023 camping season and hopefully being ready for the 2024 season. The projected costing is in the region of £350,000. With thanks to a legacy of £200,000 left by the late Christian Strover we have a head start on funding but are in full swing to raise the remainder to make the whole project viable. If anyone can support this project, we welcome your help.



Fundraising

Throughout 2022 we attended events to help fundraise and promote Woodlarks Camp Site Trust.

In May, Amy Meyers, Nick Richards and Dave Gill attended the Investor show at the QEII in London. Woodlarks are very lucky that we have been connected to the show for many years and they continue to invite us back as their chosen charity.
